PUEBLO UNIT PROGRAM DATA: 3/19/14-11/6/14

Admissions:

- There have been 27 admissions to date
- Twenty-two unique girls have been admitted
- Of the 27 admissions:
 - 9 from Journey House
 - 6 were parole admissions (5 home; 1 foster home)
 - 2 from Touchstone
 - 2 from Detention
 - 2 from an escape (from another facility) status
 - 1 from Ability Beyond Disability (DMHAS)
 - 1 from Phoenix House
 - 1 from Children's Center
 - 1 from York
 - 1 from an adult shelter
 - 1 from Solnit

- The 27 admissions were from the following Regions:

Discharges:

- There have been 21 discharges to date:
 - 11 to congregate care settings (e.g., Journey House, group homes, other RTCs)
[average length of stay: 39 days]
 - 8 to home settings [average length of stay: 67 days]
 - 2 to other settings [average length of stay: 44 days]

Clinical Services:

Pueblo has two full-time clinical staff (a licensed clinical psychologist and a licensed clinical social worker); a part time psychiatrists; twenty-four hour, seven-day a week clinical on-call; and weekend clinical coverage for girls on any type of safety watch. The girls have two scheduled individual sessions weekly, and clinical groups four days a week. (Additional sessions are provided as needed.) The groups include Dialectical Behavioral Therapy (DBT); Residential Student Assistance Program (RSAP, a substance-abuse education program); and Seven Challenges (a substance abuse treatment program). Clinicians schedule and facilitate both an initial/discharge planning meeting for each new admission within the first week of the date of admission.

Placement (Discharge) Options include:

- Home settings (including foster care)
- Group Homes (Therapeutic; "PASS", and Maternity)
- Residential Placements

Physical Interventions:

The number of restraints (including mechanical) has reduced over the life of the program. The program went through some initial "growing pains," and all staff were re-trained in the use of physical interventions and handcuffs, including on-site coaching and ongoing consultation with administrative staff regarding the use of physical interventions.
